OUR REMIT

National Historic Ships UK (NHS-UK) receives an annual grant from the Department of Digital, Culture, Media & Sport (DCMS) based on the following remit:

- to act as the primary source of independent and objective advice to the Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport, other government departments, the Devolved Administrations and public bodies on matters which directly or indirectly involve or affect historic vessels and the environments in which they are to be found
- to act as a source of advice to the *National Lottery Heritage Fund* and other grant-giving bodies across the UK on maritime conservation priorities, and applications they receive relating to funding historic ships, their environments, and associated projects
- to provide leadership and strategic vision across the UK historic ships communities and wider maritime sectors by acting as the official voice for historic vessels, pursuing proactive engagement with the sector, the UK government, the Devolved Administrations, public and private agencies, and communities at large.


ACTIVITIES & ACHIEVEMENTS

2020-21 saw NHS-UK adapt to remote working in the face of the global pandemic and national lockdowns. We offered support to the sector, while delivering 95% of services remotely and maintaining focus on the priorities in our *FORWARD PLAN*:

THE NATIONAL REGISTERS

Updates continued across: the National Register of Historic Vessels (NRHV); the National Historic Fleet (NHF); the National Archive of Historic Vessels (NAHV); the Overseas Watch List (OWL); and the UK Replica List with 28 new craft added overall to our database this year. In July, £9,250 was distributed via our Small Grants Scheme to support registered vessels undertaking a range of sustainability work. The time usually allocated to in-person visits and meetings was redeployed, enabling us to draft a further 17 statements of significance for Fleet vessels and complete the allocation of craft into vessel groups ahead of the Registers Review. The Registration Working Group was re-formed in January 2021.

CASEWORK & EXPERT ADVICE

The initial emphasis was on gathering evidence for the Select Committee inquiry into the impact of Covid-19 on DCMS sectors. Our response summarised data from over 100 organisations, documenting the effect of the pandemic on 78 NHF vessels. The Director took part in regular 'Leaders in Lockdown' sessions, hosted by the Heritage Alliance (HA), in addition to meetings of the HMS Victory Project Board and the Cutty Sark Advisory Committee. Vessel casework increased due to Covid-19 pressures and expert advice was given to DCMS, the Pilgrim Trust, the Headley Trust and the National Trust. The Policy, Projects & Course Manager represented us on the Canal & River Trust Collections Development Advisory Group and co-chaired the Digital, Learning and Skills HA Advocacy Group. In Summer 2020, a research internship was hosted to explore the impact of climate change on historic vessels. A national survey of over 1,200 British adults was undertaken in partnership with the Federation Skills Trust to look at the level of support for the heritage transport sector in the UK.

SHIPSHAPE NETWORK

The Shipshape Network celebrated its tenth anniversary in a virtual event across Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. 49 posts throughout the day created 23,386 impressions and offered an opportunity to look back on our favourite Network moments, recognising the projects, people and skills at the heart of the sector. We also reached the milestone of 100 external maritime projects supported by the Network, marked by a £100 voucher awarded to Grimsby Fishing Heritage. In 2021, five new Shipshape hubs will be launched to act as ambassadors for the Network across the eight UK zones.

SHIPSHAPE HERITAGE TRAINING PARTNERSHIP PROJECT (SHTP 2)

The SHTP 2 project was heavily impacted by the pandemic with trainees unable to remain at their host sites or gain the planned practical at-sea skills during the summer season. Alternative online learning was put in place and, when restrictions eased, a masterclass was held in Bristol and three learning films produced as part of the project legacy. Thanks to a grant increase of £9,500 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, it became possible to offer tailored placement extensions into the 2021 sailing season to allow trainees to maximise their experience.

DISTANCE LEARNING

Students undertaking our online qualification in Historic Vessel Conservation (HVC) grew to 18 with the addition of our first international learner. It proved difficult to access case study vessels during the pandemic, so new forms of online engagement were provided with the introduction of live chats and a panel session featuring the Windermere Jetty collection. A virtual Markers' Day was held in February to continue the development of portfolio assessment, offering an alternative option for students to display their learning.

OUTREACH & ENGAGEMENT

Facebook groups were established to improve communication amongst vessel owners and Shipshape projects during the pandemic and a Covid-19 resource page added to the website. Courtesy of our Heritage Alliance membership, Arcade Ltd produced an online gallery of photography competition images from the last decade which had 500 visits in the first fortnight. Due to Covid restrictions, our annual Awards Ceremony was hosted virtually for the first time and was pre-recorded on HMS *Belfast*, then screened via our website reaching an audience of 2,500. Wider sector online activity included participation in events organised by the HQS *Wellington* Trust and the Maritime Heritage Trust. Website figures for 2020 show an increase of 19% since the previous year.
