

I have been tasked with creating digital documentation of a large collection of historical boat plans and other miscellaneous items from Forbes boat builders. This is proving to be a painstaking task, though definitely interesting. At the point of writing this, I have gotten through 105 plans, after about eight hours of working on this.

Boatyard

The start of the month was exciting, as we launched *Athene*. She is looking absolutely wonderful, and it's great to have this feeling of pride so early on in the placement. The plans now are to advertise her and find a potential buyer. I do not expect this to be difficult – see for yourself from the photo!
